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SECTION TWO:

A call to "Come"

WEEK TWO: Matthew 19:14—But Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me and do not hinder them."

As we begin this year through the scriptures, we want our children to know God's heart for them. Jesus says, "come," sit on my lap as I share with the crowds (Matthew 19:14). Another time he says, "whoever receives [a] child... receives me" (Mark 9:37). In every interaction Jesus has with children, his welcoming call assures them: you are not a bother, you are not a pest, you are not in the way (as some around you may think). His call, his extended hand, the way he stops and receives the interruptions, the way he brings the children alongside, all show our Lord's heart and care for even the youngest ones.

Thoughts for Further Discussion and Study:

- God is calling you to come and get to know him this year through his word. He never wants you to stand far off. He never says, "this is just for adults." When our Lord sees the little children, he extends his hands and says, "Let the little children come."
- God is for you. Even if someone wants to dismiss you, or treat you harshly, or say you don't matter, God is always for you. (And parents, when our actions fail to express this to our children, it is good to go back and say so: "I'm sorry, I wasn't expressing God's heart when I did that.")





SECTION THREE:

A call to "Seek"

WEEK THREE: Jeremiah 29:13—You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart.

WEEK FOUR: Matthew 6:33—But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you.

This first year through *Written and Hidden* is meant to be a time of seeking. Together, we are seeking God's heart. If God wants our children to come to him, what does he want to say? Does he have any specific words for the problems that they will run into as a 6- or 7- or 8-year-old? What does he say about being afraid? Feeling hopeless? What about disobedience, honoring parents, or the way we speak and live? As our children grow, we want to help them develop the habit of seeking the Lord in everything.

Thoughts for Further Discussion and Study:

- We may think or feel one way, but we need to seek God to discover his heart.
- Seeking is never half-hearted. What words does God connect with his command to "seek"? (first, all your heart)
- Why does God want us to seek him? Why does he sometimes "hide"?
- Do you like to play hide-and-seek? Do you like being the hider or the seeker? Why? What is your reaction when you are found? (*There is joy in finding, and also joy in being found.*)
